

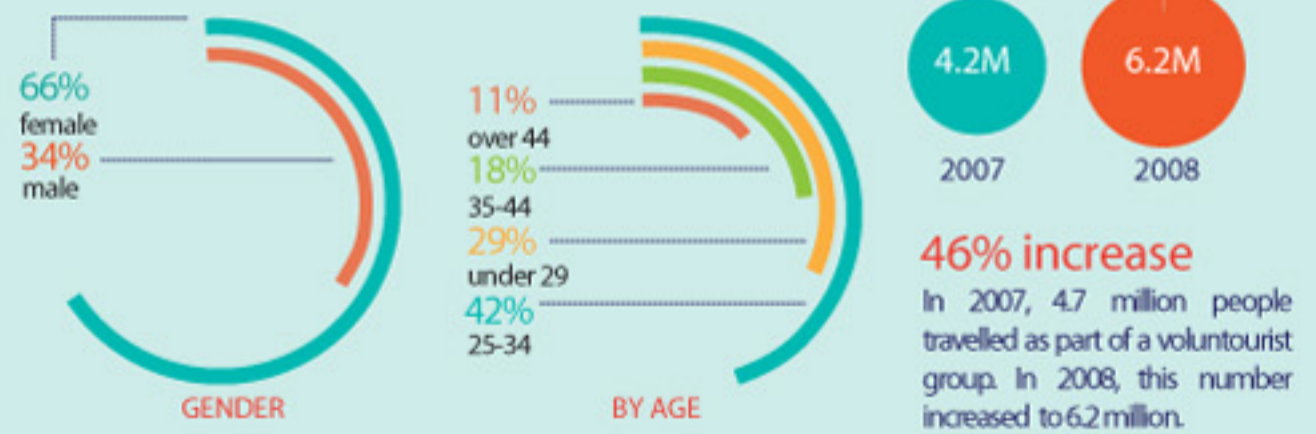
Q: What Is Voluntourism? What Are the Economics Of Voluntourism?

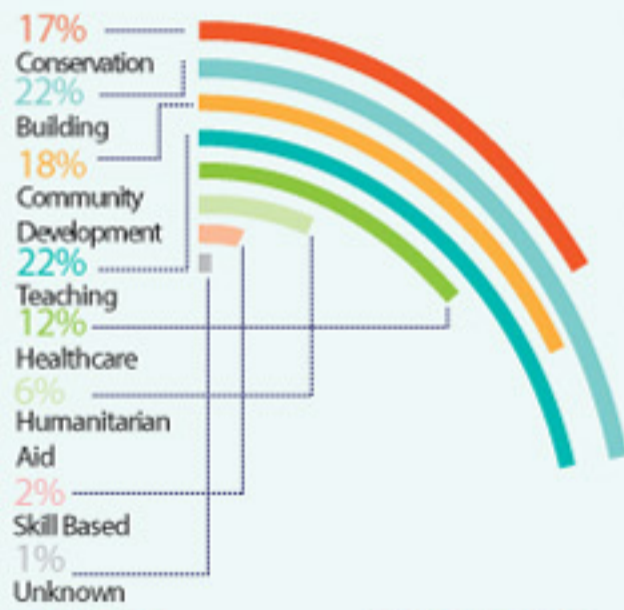
BEGINNINGS OF VOLUNTOURISM

The idea of combining voluntary service with travel is not a new concept. Volunteer Service Overseas and the US Peace Corps were among the first. However, it was not until the 1990s that the travel industry found a niche combining philanthropy and leisure. The first company to do so was Catalyst Marketing, Inc, now called Volun-Tours.

The reasons why people volunteer and travel are as varied and unique as the voluntourists themselves. However, there are many that fall into three main categories, according to age, dedication level and personal interests.

VANGUARDS

PRAGMATISTS

- Interested in developing a relationship with the host community.
- Not as wealthy as other groups
- Prefer to volunteer in Europe

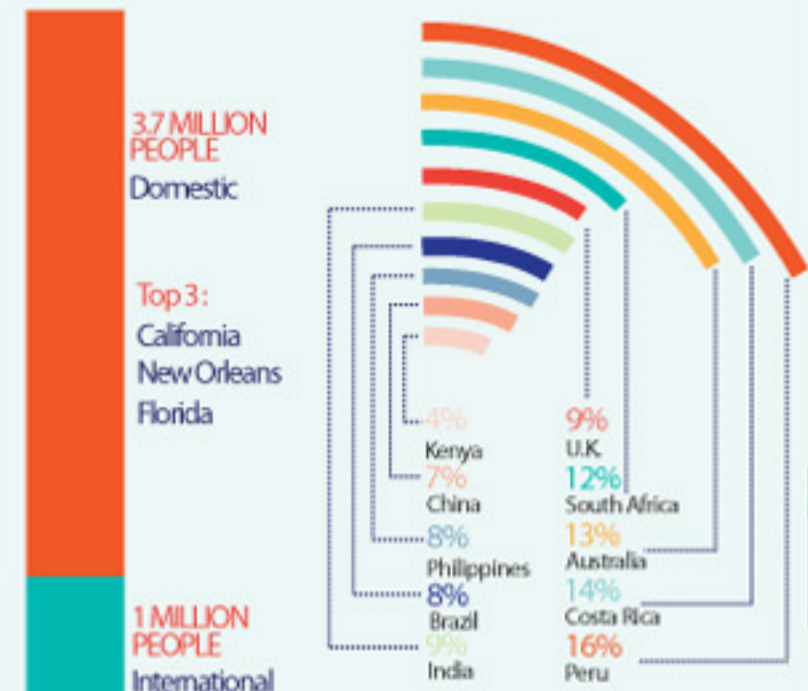
QUESTERS

- Tend to prefer South America

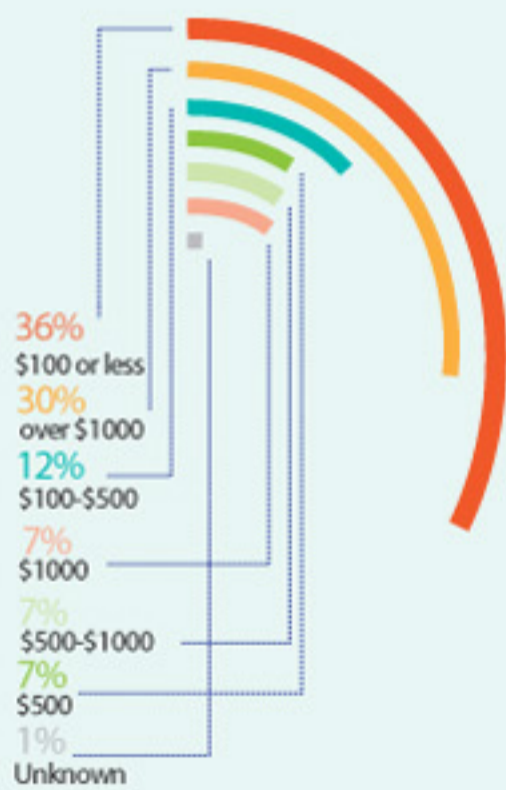
WHERE DO THEY VOLUNTRAVEL?

Paying to Volunteer

The idea of paying to volunteer may seem like an undesirable notion to some. However, it is important to consider that when travelling anywhere for more than one night, food and accommodations will be the primary cost, in most cases. At the same time, there have been allegations of voluntourist agencies inflating the costs of their trips.

The voluntourist site "I-to-I" quotes the trip package to volunteer with children in Ecuador as \$1869.00, including training, airport pick-up, room and board. However, a similar program sponsored by the NGO CENIT (Centro de la Niña Trabajadora) has a total cost of \$1440.00, including airfare, visa, home stay, meals and transportation.

PROS

- Embraces the idea that leisure and social conscience can go hand-in-hand
- Meets the needs of busy people who want to volunteer and travel
- Brings renewed interest to international agencies like the Peace Corps
- Once people have voluntouristed they are more likely to volunteer at home

CONS

- Expands the trend of episodic volunteering
- Most of the money generated goes to the travel agency and not the local community
- A majority of voluntourists only stay for 2 to 3 weeks. Very little time to make a lasting impact
